Ed of Nashville

As we waited for the shuttle to take us back to the airport, up walked a homeless man, asking for help. I gave him a dollar from my pocket, and he lingered a while. We knew Ed from before; we knew that he didn't just take the money and move on. After a little small talk, he asked my wife, "what do you do?" She answered that she was a minister. To that he replied, "I knew you was either a piano player or a minister. One of those two." Heather offered that we were both ministers, opening a gap so wide that Ed jumped in with both feet. Looking from one to the other of us, Ed asked, "So, what's it all about?" Oh my. Hoping that it was either a rhetorical question or that he was about to give us his opinion, we nodded our heads and repeated his question slowly, "what's it all about..." Ed responded in turn, "Yeah, what's it all about?" There was no escaping it now. My wife and I looked at each other wide-eyed and came up with the brilliant response, "That's a good question," stalling. In a moment of blind inspiration, the word "relationships" came out of my mouth. "Relationships to God; relationships to each other." While speaking to Ed, of course, I didn't realize what grace had transpired there. I was just relieved to have had an answer to offer him. It was weeks later that a personal epiphany allowed me the joy of that truth.

Relationships.

We do good things; we do bad things. We do well; we do poorly. Life is good; Life is bad. Life is easy; Life is hard. The only thing that survives and pulls us through it all is our relationships. Our bond with others grows with us, bending and flexing with our inconsistencies, our shortcomings, and our triumphs. In relationships we find understanding, receive forgiveness, and feel love.

In Romans 12:18, we read that we are to "strive to be on good terms with everyone..." The only way to achieve this is to actually be in relationship with others. We can't love our neighbors without forgiving them; we can't forgive them before understanding them, we can't understand them without some level of relationship.

Our relationship to God should be simpler. Earthly relationships are difficult and complex because both individuals can be inconsistent, unforgiving, and closed-minded. Knowing that God is consistent, forgiving and open to us leaves the real stumbling blocks of the

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relationship squarely on our side of the equation. If we don't feel as though we have a relationship with God, we have the heavy weight of the knowledge that it's our fault. With this in mind, it would seem that we have the awesome responsibility of reconciling our differences, and the mind-boggling amount of work that goes with it to do. Faced with such a task we often stumble, or worse, turn away, adding to the reconciling that we have to do – perhaps when we're feeling stronger, up to the challenge. But when will that be? When are we going to be up to the challenge of righting our relationship with God? Of making amends for all that we've done? The Bible confirms our worst fears: we're never going to be up to that challenge. Ever since we were first called “big boys and girls” we've held tightly to the exhilaration that doing things on our own brings. The worst fear of any adult in this society is to not be self-sufficient. Our first clue about a right relationship with God comes from this: We are the *children* of God. Jesus bade the children to come to him in Mark 10:13 saying that their faith, the way they came forward, was the way we should receive the Kingdom. We are to be as children with our trust and our faith in a greater power than we possess. “But not *me*, I've done too much, been too bad, gone too long...” From this comes our second understanding of our relationship with God. Just as we are to be like children to God, God is to us as a perfect parent. It is in this understanding that Jesus gave us the illustration of the Prodigal son. It doesn't matter what you've done, how much you've done, how little you've done, God is waiting with open arms, more than willing to offer you complete forgiveness for the sake of the relationship. The heavy burden of lifting away all of our self-imposed obstacles is rightfully ours, but God will effortlessly sweep them away to allow for our return. A right relationship with God is able to pull us through any earthly or unearthly trial.

In response to my answer, Ed held together the index and middle fingers of his right hand, and waving them said, “Closeness. Closeness. That's what it's all about. Whether it be closeness to each other, between man and wife,” he said, his hand indicating the space between Heather and me, “or between you and...” his hand traversed a line between us and the heavens. He didn't want to say it, but of course he didn't have to. “Closeness.” God bless you, Ed of Nashville.

Building Development Committee Update

Throughout the summer months, your Development Committee has continued working to bring us closer to our parish family vision for IHS. On June 1st and 2nd, we met with four contractors who submitted budgetary proposals based upon the project concept design. On June 28th, the committee reviewed those proposals and narrowed the field to two of the bidding contractors. Following the advice of our architect, we made our first round of selections focusing mainly on responses to experience-related questions around such issues as their involvement with similar construction endeavors, knowledge regarding what is required when working in the presence of children, ability to keep the facility accessible during construction and willingness to adapt to plan changes that might be necessary to reduce costs. We submitted our recommendations to the Vestry.

On June 15th, the property manager for the diocese met with committee members to lend his expertise. His advice and suggestions included emphasis on first obtaining the services of an engineering firm to conduct surveys required to obtain township approvals.

Cornerstone Architects sent proposal requests to five engineering firms asking them to submit their budgetary costs. All responded and the architect gave us his recommendation based upon cost, his knowledge of the firm and the location from which service would be provided.

With approval of our Vestry, we have moved into the Capital Campaign's Feasibility Study Phase discussed in the summer 2011 Glad Tidings newsletter. On August 31st, during a conference call, we presented a high estimate of costs to our Episcopal Church Foundation consultant.

Keep in mind that some design adaptations can be expected along the way in order to

manage costs without compromising quality of construction. Be assured, the vision of a welcoming church with full accessibility and visibility to the community will not be compromised. In fact, a recent schematic change suggested by the architect brings us even closer to our goals with some expected cost reduction.

We have minutes from our meetings and records of all communications concerning our building project. Many thanks to Bev Brescia who has worked hard to keep up to date a Building Development Committee file which she organized and is available in the church office.

Additional information will be coming your way very soon regarding the Feasibility Study. As always, input will be greatly needed from members of our parish family.

This is an exciting time for IHS and we continue to ask for God's prayers for His grace and guidance to lead us in the direction He chooses for us.
